
ProQuest Platform Updates

Document View changes

- Reducing the size of the document information at the top of the page to put more emphasis on the document itself.
- Moving the format options from tabs across the top of the document to a panel on the left hand side of the page, improving navigation and bringing the top of the document higher up the page.
 - This panel moves with the user as they scroll to read & review each document, making it easier to get access to different formats, when needed.
 - The panel also includes links to References as well as lists of documents that cite the item being viewed as well as those that cite the same sources (shared references).
- The database/platform search option has moved from the body of the page into the site header, where a user can toggle a search field into view if & when they need one.
- All changes have been extensively tested with users.



Document View -> search field



Now instructors can seamlessly link to their institution's ProQuest content from within their LMS, without leaving their course environment.




Authentication Improvement – following a ProQuest link

We want to allow all unauthenticated users following a link to ProQuest content having an account ID in the URL path, such as this one, to access that content:



Currently, if an unauthenticated user follows a link with an account ID in the path, they are taken to the preferred authentication landing page of that account ID's institution, where they get to a dead end and are unable to proceed.



New RefWorks integration for My Research

- My Research user accounts on the ProQuest Platform have, to date, made use of legacy RefWorks although the Export to RefWorks option always gives you a choice
- If a user has both versions of RefWorks & they are using My Research, they will be prompted to migrate their My Research account to the new version.
 - If they are only using the legacy version, then there will be no change.
- Once the user has migrated, behavior and functionality within My Research and across the platform will be no different than before.
- New users setting up a My Research account will be using 'new RefWorks' by default.



Accessibility: screen reader & keyboard focus


• To improve the overall accessibility of the ProQuest Platform for users who use a screen reader or a keyboard to navigate, we have adjusted the focus implementation. This means that we will show where a user is within the UI as they move around more clearly.

 We have followed guidelines established by Deque Systems to ensure we meet the WCAG 2.1 standard for visible focus and in preparation for WCAG 2.2 next year.


ProQuest Historical Periodicals

Content details

- Coverage: Vast body of material (36M pages; 3,000+ publications; coverage from 1681-2015). Covers key categories of historical serial content, including scholarly journal backfiles, consumer/trade magazine archives, and miscellaneous popular periodicals from the 17th-21st centuries
- Subject areas: Richly cross-disciplinary, serving research topics across the spectrum of the arts, humanities, and social sciences
- Format: Page images, with article-level index records and fully searchable text.



Content details

- Wealth of key content available: Over 2.5M pages of content across 18 publications, spanning the years 1846-2005. Default coverage is from the first issue through to 2005*
- Separate collections: Available as three separately purchasable collections (Collection 3 scheduled to launch June 2021)
- Major publications: Features many of the leading, most-influential, and longest-running magazines of this type, including Ladies' Home Journal, Good Housekeeping, and Cosmopolitan
- Subject coverage: Richly cross-disciplinary coverage, with material pertaining to areas including women's studies, history, the arts / entertainment, sociology, fashion, media, health, and marketing history
- Format: Article-level indexing with color page images and searchable text. Document type indexing, permitting easy retrieval of specific content, such as advertisements, fashion, health & fitness, photographs

















Queer Pasts

- Collection of primary source exhibits for students and scholars of queer history and culture, curated by academic editors Marc Stein and Lisa Arellano
- Uses "queer" in its broadest and most inclusive sense, embracing LGBT topics as well as other sexual and gender formations that are queer.
- Launch in November 2021 with 3 exhibits, followed by 3 more in Spring 2022.
- Modeled on *Women and Social Movements*, this new database will be of interest to researchers in queer studies, college and university teachers and undergraduate and graduate students. All content will undergo a double-blind peer review process.

- Every exhibit will include
 - introductory essay
 - 20-40 primary source documents
 - documents will appear in both their original form and in (searchable) transcription
- Introductory essay will
 - explain the significance of the primary sources in historical terms and in relationship to previous scholarship
 - address the strengths, limitations, and characteristics of the archive
 - explore ways in which archives are constructed, constrained, and contested

Queer Pasts – Editors And Their Vision

Queer Pasts is a collection of primary source exhibits for students and scholars of queer history and culture. We prioritize projects that focus on the experiences and perspectives of under-represented historical groups, including people of color, trans people, and people with disabilities.



Marc Stein is the Jamie and Phyllis Pasker Professor of History at San Francisco State University. He is a historian of U.S. law, politics, and society, with research and teaching interests in constitutional law, social movements, gender, race and sexuality.



Lisa Arellano is a visiting Professor of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies at Mills College and Research Associate at Colby College. Her research and teaching focus on comparative social movements, critical historiography and violence studies.


